The Copenhagen Girls' Choir with Afenginn & Maggie Bjorklund

Tuesday, March 26, 2019 7:30 p.m.

The Copenhagen Girls' Choir rates among the best of its kind in Denmark and is recognized abroad for their

homogenous sound - a result of the extensive voice-training the singers receive. The choir was founded in 1973 and is under the patronage of H.R.H. Princess Benedikte. On their U.S. tour they will be performing with the award-winning ensemble Afenginn and the pedal steel player Maggie Bjorklund. The Concert repertoire consists of new Nordic Music composed for this tour, classical choral music, and re-compositions of classical repertoire. Composer and front man in Afenginn, Kim Nyberg, has a strong Nordic voice in his compositions that encompasses classical techniques, Scandinavian folk music and the odd meters of eastern European music. Maggie Bjorklund's exceptional and poetic pedal steel playing is an interesting link between Denmark and the U.S., where she has toured extensively as a soloist and with American artists. The concert will feature all ensembles together as well as choir a cappella pieces and some instrumentals.

The Special Session of our church's General Conference, held this past week in St. Louis, gave pretty well everyone a reason to be disappointed. It had been called to provide "A Way Forward" for our denomination around issues of same sex relationships. Some 900 delegates from around the world gathered at the America's Center Convention Complex for four days of worship, prayer, conversation and argument about our future.

The background to the gathering included the recommendation by our College of Bishops of the One Church Plan. That would have allowed each member of the clergy, each congregation and region of the church to follow their own conscience.

This did not satisfy some more conservative United Methodists here in the U.S., as well as many more in Africa and Asia. They wanted to tighten enforcement of our existing rules prohibiting both the celebration of same sex marriages and the ordination of lesbian or gay clergy. Ultimately, this Traditionalist Plan was approved, 438-384. Had the vote been taken among United Methodists in the U.S. only, the One Church Plan would have passed by a significant margin.

Though approved, the Traditionalist Plan faces significant obstacles. It includes a number of provisions which our Judicial Council had already ruled unconstitutional. Those rejected proposals had mostly to do with enforcement. Without them, it is hard to see what any of it will really mean. The Judicial Council will review the entire plan in April, to decide whether all or any part of it will survive. It is possible that those provisions which were not unconstitutional may be implemented, or that the entire plan will be tossed out.

Before the meeting some of our more conservative churches and leaders in the U.S. worked to create an exit strategy from the United Methodist Church. They had planned to leave if the One Church Plan were approved. One of those groups, the Wesleyan Covenant Association, may well still decide to depart. I do not know. They are meeting this week to choose their course.

Most Methodists in the Western U.S. hoped that the One Church Plan would pass. It reflects where many clergy and congregations have moved in recent years. It allows for a diversity of understanding among us. It does not force anyone to believe or act against their own convictions. At the end of the Special Session, there was an invitation by a leader in the Western Jurisdiction for those of like mind and heart to be in conversation as we seek a different way forward. It is possible that United Methodists from the Rockies, west, will live out of a different understanding from what the General Conference decided. It is also likely that many others from across our country, including some of our healthiest and largest congregations, will want to do the same.

It's fair to say that no one is, or really should be, happy about any of this. Over the course of the four days many unfortunate, unkind, and even un-Christian things were said by people across the spectrum. It was obvious that people were afraid of what would happen if their side lost. In the end, I believe we all lost.

April and I have already had conversations with many of you about this, and we are open to continuing that discussion over the coming weeks, months, and years. We feel especially for the families in our congregation who know and love their gay children and grandchildren, partners and spouses, brothers and sisters, aunts and uncles and cousins. As we say each month at communion, "the table is open." Our church is open, and we want all who find welcome and home here to know that we are grateful to be with you in the Church, the Body of Christ. We look forward to a strong and healthy future together as a family of faith, hope and love.

Message from Martha Rowlett, Senior Pastor Emeritus

In January I wrote about the gifts of Christmas. In February I wrote about New Year's resolutions. Now it is March, and I have a new take on Valentines. Jonathan and April may give you "Breaking News." I am more likely to share about "news that broke last month." So be forewarned! In February, my pastor here preached on an intriguing topic: "Send a Valentine to Someone You Do Not Like." He described a daily prayer practice that is like making every day Valentine's Day with the Valentines being blessings. Blessing, he said, is the art of being spiritually present to others in prayer and asking for God to surround a particular person or situation with three things: love, healing and peace. God is already willing for and offering to everybody and everything these three things. But the "Valentine prayer" says that you are willing these things too. He says that he starts with asking for himself, or opening himself to receive, love, healing and peace from God. Then he prays a blessing for a good friend. Thus warmed up, he turns to someone he does not like, sharing with God that he wishes for them to receive these gifts "Try to hold them gently in your heart," he says, "Release to God any anger or tension that may arise in you. Let these feelings go by setting them free to God's care." You may not want to start with praying a blessing for your worst enemy, but just with someone you dislike. He closes his prayer time by expanding his Valentine blessing list out to neighbors, friends, and eventually to people everywhere. Then he takes a few deep breathes and closes his prayer time. I have had a few transformational experiences with Valentine prayers of blessing already, and it is just March. Thought you might be interested.


Ash Wednesday, March 6


UMCOR Sunday-March 31


